
Course Selection Process

Make "Above the Line" Choices Now...

Get "Above the Line" Results Next Year and Beyond



- **1.** Teachers make recommendations March 4-8.
- Students select courses in the portal March 9-17.
- **3.** Students meet with counselors during history class to review courses selected March 18-28



The Course Selection Process (10 mins)

- Classes that are offered are **based on what students sign up for**. This includes which electives are offered and what levels of classes students request.
- Students should request classes based on what they realistically believe they are capable of and the amount of work they are realistically willing and able to do. Teacher recommendations are very thoughtful and take into account what teachers have seen evidenced by each student in terms of demonstrated ability and work completion.

Placement Review-Course Recommendation Override

Sometimes parents / students choose to override teacher recommendations and request placement in a more demanding level (course recommendation override). There are risks in doing so.

- A student who does poorly in a more advanced class weakens their transcript. Sometimes, difficulties in one course generate difficulties in others as well.
- To keep up with the class, the student may require more individual help than the teacher can reasonably be expected to provide. The demands of an advanced curriculum do not allow teachers to accommodate to the pace of a student who is misplaced. The teacher cannot provide individual tutoring.



Placement Review-Course Recommendation Override

Sometimes parents / students choose to override teacher recommendations and request placement in a more demanding level (course recommendation override). There are risks in doing so.

- We cannot assure that a student who has difficulty will be able to move to a lower level. Classes are tightly scheduled, and it may not be possible to find a place in the new class once the academic school year has begun. The student must then either drop the course completely or remain in the requested section despite diminished performance.
- When a transfer is possible, it may be necessary to reschedule other classes to accommodate the shift. This general disruption can cause problems in other courses where the student may be doing well.

4. Students make final course selections

- When applicable, families complete the online override form.
 - Override forms and/or any other changes are due 4/5/24 at noon.

Changes to course requests past the deadline may not be accommodated because the schedule is built and faculty are assigned based on information received from students and parents during the course selection period.

Rising Seniors (current juniors)

*PE requirement: Take one semester of PE <u>OR</u> play one season of a sport <u>OR</u> do 72 hours of exercise at an outside gym.

*All seniors must take two semester-long English courses, unless in AP English Literature. Please choose wisely. Also have a back up choice. New offerings in English: Film and Media Literacy (formerly Film Studies, now NCAA approved); Disability Voices in Literature

*All seniors must take 30 credits, unless you have 3 AP courses (20 credits required). Please choose alternates for your electives.





- Songwriting and Studio Video




Music Elective Courses, Continued
